What Are Advanced Placement® Courses?



Advanced Placement *: The Basics

- AP® courses are college-level courses offered in high school
- Courses reflect what is taught in top introductory college courses
- Students take national AP Exams the first 2 weeks in MAY, measuring their mastery of college-level work
- A score of 3 or higher on an AP exam can typically earn students college credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college





What is the academic difference between AP® and Honors?

- Honors provides some RIGOR within the State standards
- AP® provides the most RIGOR at the high school level and includes national standards <u>beyond</u> the State standards
- RIGOR is NOT simply more homework or more of the same thing
- **RIGOR** <u>is</u> depth of understanding, depth of questioning, depth in how students apply what they've learned, and depth in the process and product related to their learning is really what we're talking about.





For instance...

- On-Level
 - "In 1492 Columbus sailed the ocean blue"
- Honors
 - Columbus' discovery impacted the native Americans negatively.
- AP
 - How did Columbus' discovery impact Europe, Africa and the Americas?

- **History and Social Sciences:** Human Geography (9th), World History (10th), US History (11th), Macroeconomics (12th), US Government and Politics (12th) European (elective 11th or 12th), Psychology (elective 11th or 12th)
- Mathematics: Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Statistics (11th or 12th)

How Much!?

- \$25 registration fee (non-refundable)
- \$92 per exam
- The State <u>usually</u> pays for 1 exam for Free/Reduced Lunch students
- College Board reduces subsequent exams for F/R students
- South Cobb offers a scholarship program to offset costs.

AP®: The Benefits



AP® from the College Admissions Perspective

- 85% of selective colleges and universities report that a student's AP experience favorably impacts admission decisions*
- Colleges rank grades in college-preparatory courses and strength of curriculum as the two top factors in the admission decision
- AP courses tell college admission officials that students are challenging themselves and preparing for the rigors they'll encounter in their college careers

AP® Helps Students Graduate on Time & Save Money

- •Students who take AP courses and exams are much more likely to complete a college degree on time.* Graduating in four years represents a significant savings on the cost of college.
- Only 1 in 4 college students completes a bachelor's degree in 4 years.
- The average cost of college for a single year is \$21,500** for in-state schools (tuition, fees, room/board, misc. expenses).

AP and College Success

- Students who take AP courses and exams are much more likely than their peers to complete a bachelor's degree in four years or less
- No AP 29% likely to finish in 4 years
- One AP 45% likely to finish in 4 years
- Two + AP 61% likely to finish in 4 years
- Another report shows that students who took AP courses were at least twice as likely to graduate college within five years (CPE 2012).





Impact of AP on 5-Year College Graduation Rates

Student Group	AP Exam Grade of 3, 4, 5	AP Exam Grade of 1, 2	Took AP course, but not exam
African- American	28% higher	22% higher	16% higher
Hispanic	28% higher	12% higher	10% higher
White	33% higher	22% higher	20% higher
Low-Income	26% higher	17% higher	12% higher
Not Low- Income	34% higher	23% higher	19% higher

• \$89 per credit hour = \$267 per class (hasn't gone up in 3 years!!)

Kennesaw State

\$177 per credit hour = \$531 per class

Georgia

• Flat rate fee (based on 15 or more credit hours) \$4682 (roughly \$312 per credit hour = \$936 per class)

Emory

• Fixed rate flat fee (based on 12 or more credit hours) \$45,700 (roughly \$3,808 per credit hour = \$11,425 per class)



Ways Parents Can Help Their AP Students

- Set priorities at home
 - Provide quiet space and time for study

 - Even if the grades in the early weeks of the class are NOT what you are used too!! (and they probably won't be!)
- Quiz your student or have him or her "teach" you
- Purchase a review book or other study materials
- Encourage your student to participate in study groups
- Encourage good attendance
- Help set up study groups
- Be prepared to pay for the exams
